Telemedicine In Focus: narrowing the gap of living standards between Yerevan and rural Armenia

The Armenia Fund USA Telemedicine program, first launched with the completion of the Armine Pagoumian Polyclinic and Hirair and Anna Hovnanian Diagnostic Center in Stepanakert in 2005. It is an innovative approach to disseminating medic knowledge and best practices through technology The success of the program was marked by yet another teleconference held at the Yerevan State Medical University (YSMU) of Mkhitar Heratsi in Febru ary, 2008.

Sponsored by Armenia Fund USA, and organ ized by the Department of Postaraduate/Continuing Education at YSMU, the teleconference focused on pediatrics and connected medical professionals in this field from different parts of the country. While the main two focal points of the teleconference were Yerevan and Stepanakert, many of the participating pediatricians came from more than a dozen regions of Armenia, including Goris, Armavir, Vahgarshapat Martuni, Alaverdi, Berd, Idjevan, Dilidjan, Masis, Abovian, Charentsavan, Artashat, and Aragats.



Armenia Fund sponsors a new series of Yerevan-Stepanakert Teleconferences on Pediatrics

A Second Teleconference...

A second teleconference, this time focusing on infectious diseases was held on February 22, 2008. Through a Yerevan-Salzburg telemedicineconference, Dr. Ellen A. Morrison from the Division of Infectious Diseases at the Department of Medicine/ Columbia University Medical Center delivered a full series of lectures on "Infectious Causes of Diarrhea." The teleconference drew the participation of more than thirty physicians from Yerevan, Department of Pediatrics and Infectious Diseases at YSMU, and pediatricians from different regions of the country.

"This is truly exciting - seeing our telemedicine program fully functional to deliver quality healthcare to the underserved regions of rural Armenia and Karabakh. We hope that such kind of events will become more and more frequent, enabling physicians in the capital to share information and knowledge. This is what we are continuously trying to achieve - narrowing the gap of living standards between Yerevan and rural Armenia," says Irina Lazarian, the Executive Director of Armenia Fund in New York.

Armenia Fund's Telemedicine Program aims at modernizing delivery of healthcare and professional development of physicians in less developed regions of Armenia and Karabakh. Telemedicine is a much needed addition to the Rural Development Program that is upgrading the living standards of rural communities across Armenia and Karabakh.

Our Telemedicine Program and the People That Make it Happen

Telemedicine is an innovative approach to medical care linking a physician with a patient in a remote area. The state-of-the-art medical technology makes it possible to ignore constraints of time and distance, and with the concurrent advancement of Internet and digital communication, it revolutionizes the way healthcare is delivered to people in dire need.

The launch of Armenia Fund's Telemedicine Program, with the installation of equipment and provision of adequate technical training to the medical team, was a success with the completion of Armine Pagoumian Polyclinic in Stepanakert. Actual connection of remote regions to the Telemedicine network, however, remained a serious challenge. "This is where Karabakh Telecom partnership added so much value to our program", says Raffi Festekijan, Chairman of Armenia Fund USA, "We never thought it would actually be possible to conduct these advanced medical training sessions so quickly and make it available to some of the most underserved communities in the country."

Karabakh Telecom provided Armenia Fund USA with the necessary high speed Internet connection that has made possible a series of telemedicine seminars since September of 2007. But this was only the beginning. With the successful installation of equipment in Stepanak-



ert, Karabakh Telecom announced it will continue providing service to the Fund's Telemedicine program free of charge.

"Karabakh Telecom strongly believes that a strong society is the foundation of a strong nation, and accordingly whatever a commercial institution receives from society in terms of revenues, it should return part of it back to society by other means," says Ralph Yirikian at Karabakh Telecom. "Today there are over 650 needy families and individuals, 40 charitable and non-profit organizations, as well as 4 educational institutions that are benefiting all year round from assistance programs sponsored by Karabakh Telecom."

"We had to go and ask other people to come and plough our land, then to reap. Sometimes they were late, sometimes a car would break down and it cost the villagers more money."
